EREA Charter Forum: Renewing the EREA Charter and EREA Touchstones

Alongside Senior Leaders from across Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA), Mr Frank Ranaldo (Acting Deputy Principal, St Paul's College) and myself had the pleasure to attend the EREA National Charter Forum in Wollongong last week.

The EREA Charter, available HERE, guides all schools in the quest towards greater authenticity as Catholic schools in the Edmund Rice tradition, challenging each community to be faithful to the four touchstones of EREA: Liberating Education, Gospel Spirituality, Inclusive Community, Justice and Solidarity.



The Forum offered Senior Leaders (from EREA Colleges and EREA Flexible Learning Centres) the opportunity to meaningfully contribute to the renewal of the EREA Charter.

Informed by feedback already gained from many students, staff and leaders across the country, the purpose of this Charter Forum was to consolidate feedback and refine the Charter, which drives the mission of our College.

Practically, you will see the touchstone symbols throughout our college, they drive appraisals and reviews for senior leaders at our college, inform our Strategic Plan, focus formation for our School Advisory Council, and provide the basis of EREA's School Renewal Process every 5 years. While these are only some examples of how our Charter and Touchstones come to life at St Paul's, they demonstrate the significance of the Charter and therefore the current Charter renewal, in the life of our community.

Contemporary and refreshed Touchstones and EREA Charter were key hopes from the Forum in Wollongong and our community will remain connected to any developments relating to the mission of EREA that so proudly informs the mission of St Paul's College as a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice Tradition.

Supporting our children

The word 'support' can be interpreted in many different ways and sometimes while we think we might be helping our children by offering our support, we may in fact be causing them more harm than good. I would like to share with you a story which illustrates this.

A man spent hours watching a butterfly struggling to emerge from its cocoon. It managed to make a small hole, but its body was too large to get through it. After a long struggle, it appeared to be exhausted and remained absolutely still.

The man decided to help the butterfly and, with a pair of scissors, he cut open the cocoon, thus releasing the butterfly. However, the

butterfly's body was very small and wrinkled and its wings were all crumpled.

The man continued to watch, hoping that, at any moment, the butterfly would open its wings and fly away. Nothing happened; in fact, the butterfly spent the rest of its brief life dragging around its shrunken body and shrivelled wings, incapable of flight.

Out of kindness and his eagerness to help, the man had failed to understand that the tight cocoon and the efforts that the butterfly had to make in order to squeeze out of that tiny hole were nature's way of training the butterfly and strengthening its wings. The butterfly's struggle to push its way through the tiny opening of the cocoon pushes the fluid out of its body and into its wings. Without the struggle, the butterfly would never ever fly. The man's good intentions actually hurt the butterfly.

One of the messages in this story is that the struggle was part of what the butterfly needed to do in order to fly. Without the struggle, the butterfly was destined to crawl around on its belly and probably die an early death.

Life is full of struggles, which we like to call challenges. They hone our skills and make us strong. People who enable other people take this away, perpetuate co-dependency unknowingly. They are well-meaning but their intentions create more harm than good. While it is painful to watch a loved one struggle with life's daily challenges, our job is not to do their work for them. Our job is to stand by in support and love remembering that, experiencing challenges and dealing with these is necessary for growth.

As our children go through their schooling and life in general, we need to keep in mind as parents that struggling is an important part of any growth experience. In fact, it is the struggle that builds strength and resilience and causes one to develop their ability to fly.

Student Grievance Policy and Procedure

As part of our commitment to empowering student voice and fostering a safe school environment, in early Term 3 we will be launching a formalized process that allows students the opportunity to voice their concerns in a comfortable and safe manner via our Student Grievance Policy and Procedure. A 'grievance' refers to a situation where an individual believes that a student, staff member, or any member of the College community has acted outside of the normal policies and practices that the College promotes and expects.

Student grievances will be able to be lodged with an online Student Grievance Form, which will be accessible to students via the student portal on SEQTA. Of course, students are still encouraged to communicate any concerns with staff verbally or through SEQTA messages, however, this additional layer will also allow students the opportunity to remain anonymous and ensure that student grievances are passed on to relevant staff members to be managed accordingly. This process will be explained to students at the start of Term 3 through Pastoral Care groups and House gatherings.

On Friday 14 June our Year 12 students celebrated the annual Senior Formal at the Hilton Adelaide Hotel. Primary Years

Dear Families,

At least a few times a year we need to address the use of social media in the Primary Years. We are currently dealing with some issues where students are using social media (mostly Snapchat and TikTok) to post inappropriate posts and we need your help, as parents and carers, to make sure this is stopped. We work hard to help students deal with conflicts or miscommunications with each other at school but cannot control what happens at home.

Once students are at home and online, we can't be there to monitor them. This is where we need your help. It is always recommended that children do not have devices in their bedrooms or outside of their parents' viewpoints. Parents need to monitor online use. Children are in no way good at self-regulating their use on their own.

Most social media platforms in Australia have a minimum age for signing up of 13 years of age. It is hard for us to deal with these issues when we know the children in our care should not be using these apps. We do not have any children in the Primary Years who are 13 years of age and, as such, they should not be on any social media with this age limitation. This comes down to parents allowing permission for their child to access them.

When parents contact me to discuss online issues that occur out of school time on these platforms, my first recommendation is to take their child off the site. If the parent's decision is to not do this, then other children need to be blocked. Parents are also well entitled to report any misuse directly to the social media platform and to the police, if they have serious concerns. Again, this is where we need parent support. We understand how much pressure there is on children to be using social media but without proper supervision all the time, massive problems can and are occurring.

It is so crucial that there is adult monitoring and supervision, at home, of children's time online to keep them safe and to make sure they are also being appropriate themselves. **Here** are some great resources for parents and carers to use, to help keep children safe online.

A couple of reminders as we head toward the end of term; Term 2 finishes on Thursday 4 July with a casual day to raise funds for Hutt St. There is a Student Free Day on Friday 5 July and Semester 1 reports will be released via SEQTA on Monday 8 July.

Year 7 Highlights

Environmental Issues at Dry Creek: Students addressed the environmental challenges at Dry Creek and proposed innovative solutions for improvement.

Picture Books: The Year 7s also displayed picture books they created earlier in the semester. These books portrayed the challenges faced by students at the Mary Rice Centre in Kenya, highlighting their empathy and understanding of global issues.

Year 8 Highlights

Fictional Town Campaigns: Students utilised their mapping skills to design and campaign for functional, fictional towns. They drew parallels between the structure of a town and a cell, demonstrating their understanding of both geography and biology.


Pedal Prix Race 2


