

Dear Families,

Term 1 is quickly slipping away. Next week we will be celebrating Holy Week in our lead-up to Easter. Holy Week is a reminder of the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus made for us on the cross. It is a time for deep reflection on our own lives, and our relationship with God. It is also a time to let go of anything that weighs us down and to open our hearts to receive the forgiveness that God offers us. We are invited to use this time to grow closer to God, seek God's guidance, and prepare ourselves for the joy of Easter.

There are many important things in life. Celebrations are something that everyone should take time for. Celebrations add excitement and a lot of fun to life and allow us to relax and unwind amid busy and crazy lives. We enjoy celebrations because they allow us to remember the things that truly matter in life. There is something about a great celebration that reminds us of the purpose of our life and the power

of our closest relationships, especially with our God. This week students across our Primary and Secondary Years celebrated their First Reconciliation with their families at St Pius X Catholic Church. This is a very special time in their faith journey, so please keep them in your prayers.

Down Syndrome Awareness Day - "Lots of Socks" took place this week. Children wore bright coloured paired or odd socks to school. There are two main ideas behind the "Lots of Socks" theme: The 'odd socks' represent the odd number of chromosomes that people with Down Syndrome have (47 chromosomes) as chromosomes are shaped like socks. The 'odd socks' also remind us that our differences are what make us great!

Lots of Socks is a Down Syndrome International campaign to create conversation and bring awareness of Down syndrome on World Down Syndrome Day, each year. The idea behind the Lots of Socks initiative is that all types, shapes, sizes of the same thing can be unique in their own way, and yet do the same thing. Children understand what socks are, how they look and what they are for, and children understand that no two socks are the same. Lots of Socks is a campaign to create conversation about diversity, uniqueness, inclusion and acceptance.

The Year 3 and 5 classes have been busy with NAPLAN testing this past two weeks. Some parents get very concerned with these standardised tests and worry about the results. Standardised tests can be useful, in that the data obtained can direct us in areas of needed growth for the students. We also need to remember that this is a moment in time on a lifelong journey of learning and inquiry. I congratulate your children on how they have approached NAPLAN. At St Paul's, we treat this time as normal school weeks, and that seems to calm the students and allows them to try their best. When the results come back later in the year, please take the information in the context of a long journey of education.

Cyber-safety is an area of huge concern in society. As parents, I highly encourage you to be vigilant with your children about online activity. You may think you are being responsible and have things under control. This starts by allowing your children on sites where the starting age is 13 years old. This means that essentially Primary Years students should not be on sites or apps that they may currently access.

I know that one of the safest sites is Messenger Kids because you have a great deal of control. Other sites you simply do not. It may be a difficult conversation to have with your children, about whether they should be online or not. No one said parenting is easy and, in this day and age, where sites change daily and there are no restrictions or regulations to properly monitor activity, your children's safety is being compromised each time they enter a site or app. How much do you value your child's safety? Please talk with them...often.

We have so many wonderful learning opportunities underway for our Primary Years students, and it is very exciting to see the passion and commitment of our teachers and students as they engage in these experiences. It is also a great chance for you to work with your child's teacher and get involved in your child's learning. Please feel welcome to come into the learning spaces, to volunteer and share in not only your child's but other children's learning journeys. Discover SAPOL Program (Work Experience)



SOUTH AUSTRALIA POLICE SAFER COMMUNITIES

The South Australia Police (SAPOL) is pleased to offer the 'Discover SAPOL Program' (work experience program) to a limited number of students currently in years 10 - 12 who are considering SAPOL as a potential career path in the future.

The program will be based at Police Headquarters located at 100 Angas Street, Adelaide. Students will be required to attend lectures, participate in interactive problem solving activities and role play sessions. They may be attending various locations within SAPOL including, Police Academy, STAR/Dog/Mounted Operations Sections, Adelaide Magistrates and/or Youth Courts and the Water Response Section at Semaphore.

We will be conducting four (4) day work experience programs between June and October 2024. The course dates are as follows:

- Course 1 Tuesday 25/06/2024 Friday 28/06/2024
- Course 2 Tuesday 02/07/2024 Friday 05/07/2024
- Course 3 Tuesday 17/09/2024 Friday 20/09/2024
- Course 4 Tuesday 08/10/2024 Friday 11/10/2024

The approximate hours for this course will be 8-30 a.m. – 4-00 p.m. (There will be some minor variance on commencement and completion times on different days however the exact times will be confirmed later in this process). Applicants are asked to nominate their 2 preferred course dates.

This work experience opportunity is only offered to students seriously considering a career with SAPOL to apply. We would like each applicant to submit an essay explaining the reasons why they are considering joining SAPOL and taking up policing as a career.

Applicants are asked to include in this essay any relevant information relating to personal qualities and interests, eg. Details about community service, part-time/casual employment, sports and hobbies. Please do not forget to also return the Application Form which you can get from Ms Williams VET/Career Coordinator, St Paul's College. Successful candidates will be required to complete further documents including a Workplace Learning Personal Particulars/Emergency Contact Form.
