From the Acting Principal



There is no requirement to speak of one particular matter as we move well through the middle of Term 2, especially since there is so much to celebrate throughout the College, calling for gratitude from our community.

In a great celebration of students, the Primary Years assembly on Tuesday (19 June) witnessed many achievements across academic success, contributions exuding our College values (Faith, Relationships, Excellence, Diversity), and service evident in Jump Rope for Heart.

At the same time, our most senior students in Year 12 immersed themselves in their three-day Year 12 Retreat, where staff led a most formative experience on the theme 'The End is a New Beginning'. To be so vulnerable with peers while considering the daunting next steps into life (without the daily support of St Paul's College), is both brave and truly reflective, within a world that is decreasingly 'present'.

These experiences are only two examples across our College and demonstrate the great breadth of celebration, within varying parts of life's journey, that benefit our students.

In the coming weeks, our College also prepares for Semester One reports. This is one snapshot of learning over 6 months, knowing that individual feedback that has been given throughout the Semester is far more targeted, timely, and beneficial (since it is more regular). I request each family to use the Semester Report as an opportunity to positively and consecutively celebrate areas of strength and achievement while setting goals for the remainder of 2023.

Quite outrageously, families in Australia have traditionally asked questions such as, "Why didn't you do better" and "What's this grade for?". This perhaps represents many experiences of parents that is now very outdated and unhelpful, since it has no direction on how to improve! Instead, let us seek means for improvement and remain positive, by way of helping our young people improve.

In the same way, I pleaded with our Year 12 students when I had the pleasure of presenting to their Retreat this week, let us ask our students "how they want to be" (positive, kind, fun, inspiring, honest) instead of only "what the want to be" (fireman, lawyer, engineer, teacher). What we are is hard to define and sometimes a long journey to achieve; how we are as people is a proposition each day.

Primary Years Update

Regular attendance is essential for our students to be able to thrive at school. Coming to school every day not only ensures continuity of learning but also fosters a sense of belonging and supports positive social connections. We understand that absence can sometimes be unavoidable, particularly in the current season of colds and flu, and we thank our families for keeping their children home when they are unwell.

There are also many students in our Primary Years community who are regularly late to school each day. Parents and carers are reminded that school officially starts at 8.40 am each morning. It is understandable that on the odd occasion, something may occur to prevent you from being at school on time; however, a regular late arrival is very disruptive to the learning of all classes. We aim to get the children into class as soon as possible each morning after the 8.35 am bell has sounded so that learning may commence. Thank you to the students and families who are always here and on time to commence their learning.

Our college is participating in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with a Disability (NCCD Data Collection). This Data Collection is taking place in Catholic, Government, and Independent schools across Australia, and will provide valuable information about support required for a broad group of students. This will enable Australian and State governments to better target school support and resources and will also help the college give our students the support they need.

The definition of disability for the NCCD is based on the broad definition under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992. The NCCD Data Collection is not limited to students with diagnosed disabilities and includes a broad range of health and learning conditions that our college provides 'reasonable adjustments' to support. Also, a reminder that Monday 26 June is a Pupil Free Day and our Primary Years staff are participating in the second day of our BSEM (Berry Street Education Model) training. The BSEM covers four domains, all anchored by the central domain of Relationships, which is our learning focus on Monday. The Relationship Domain encourages teachers to reflect upon the importance of setting up a learning environment that promotes and meets the needs of students to feel connected with their school community; emotionally, physically, mentally, and neurologically.

Discussions held with staff will centre on how our own actions as adults can impact, positively or otherwise, a child's ability to satisfy three human yearnings: love, acceptance, and belonging. In turn, the environment which is created through our actions can create greater opportunities for "on-task behaviours" and lessen the interruptions to learning which can result from "off-task behaviours".

As we are nearing the end of term, have you thought about the upcoming school holidays? Extend, our OSHC provider offers an onsite Vacation Care Program that you can access if you need care for your child/ren. They are in the process of developing an engaging program with a mix of days onsite and some excursions. A reminder that school finishes at 3.10 pm for the term on Friday 7 July.



Pedal Prix

On Sunday 18th of June, the St Paul's College Racing Team completed the 6-hour Pedal Prix event at Victoria Park, their second race of the season and for most, their second race ever. Beginning the race at 10 am, the SPC Racing Team was positioned around 37th in the category. Harrison Linke came in as our first rider and fought hard for 10 laps, gaining around 14 positions for the team. Next up, Jacob Turner put in an amazing effort, gaining some positions on the track and holding us consistently around 21st and 22nd position. Next up Jett Collaton proved yet again to be our fastest rider, setting the team's lap record of 02:15.5 and placing us into 19th position, this record did not stand for long as later in the day he outclassed his own time with 02:14.7. From here Harry Hill, Isaac Browning and James Hall each put in outstanding lap times, maintaining 19th position. Newcomers Angelina Lorenzi, Eade Claassen, and Daniel Nussey Hartley arrived and gave it their all, demonstrating bravery considering they had never ridden the Pedal Prix car before. Angelina even had to use her quick thinking to avoid a barrel-rolling car directly in front of her. After losing a few positions, Muhammad Mahdavi and Jett Collaton fought hard, back-to-back, to gain some ground. All was smooth sailing for Lachlan Evans until disaster struck when the back wheel fell off on turn one, sending him sliding and rolling across the track. The SPC rescue team (Mr Leadbeater, Harry Linke, and Harry Hill) raced out to him, quickly put the wheel back on, and sent him on his way. From here Lachlan put in four more impressive laps with a time average of 2:36.7. Harry Linke returned to the car yet again followed by Harry Hill who finished off an all-round successful race in position 34 of 64 and a total of 108 laps.

The team as a whole were very impressive over the race, those not racing were regularly involved helping with rider changes, keeping track of times, and communicating over the radio to our riders. A special mention goes out to Harrison Linke, Harry Hill, and Jett Collaton. These three students were extremely welcoming to our new riders and demonstrated outstanding leadership by assisting in team briefings, and teaching Eade, Angelina, and Daniel how to enter and exit the Pedal Prix Car.
