Families and School - on the same journey for success

A highlight of the past fortnight has been Learning Conversations that involved families and young people discussing learning, school experience and wellbeing.

While perhaps obvious, wherever families positively engage school community and staff, their child(ren) is more likely to experience connection to the school community, trust and relationship with teachers, and success (whatever that looks like for each student). For this reason, St Paul's College expresses heartfelt thanks to families who booked and attended Learning Conversations to begin Term 2.

As a staff of St Paul's College, we pride ourselves on proactive communication with families, especially wherever there have been successes or challenges. Of course, these conversations are centered on the child and student, meaning they are deeply important and often emotional conversations.

As we all know and appreciate, healthy conversations remain respectful and focused on the care that family and school have for the young person. There are opportunities to respectfully raise concerns and it is important that families and staff can talk freely with one another; however, the college continues to seek the trust and confidence of families that we always act in the best interest of all young people.

Above all, St Paul's continues to prioritise partnership with families and seeks families to continue trusting that all decisions are made in the best interest of you and your child(ren).

Catholic School Parents Australia (CSPA) offer an array of information and resources for families around supporting their young people and the school, noting that families can and must support both parties, not one or the other.

As one body of work completed by CSPA, you may also find interest in the information at Gearing Up for Parent Engagement in Student Learning. Here, you can find resources for connecting with schools and teachers, as well as young people, as they navigate Primary or Secondary education.

From the perspective of St Paul's College, there are some crucial point we encourage for all families:

Do not hesitate to communicate: sometimes a 'wait and see' approach to your child's concern may seem appropriate – it isn't! Please communicate early so that any concerns do not compound.

Phone and in-person is most effective: while it is sometimes appropriate to use email or SEQTA, emotion can often be confused in these modes of communication, making phone calls and in-person conversations most effective.

School staff are asked to communicate proactively and often: A college directive to staff is for them to communicate with families often, especially where there are challenges or concerns. Understanding that families are busy, we commit to this communication. Staff don't make things up: great work and effort goes into supporting students through moments of challenge, perhaps poor decisions, and moments of success. Like anybody, we make mistakes; however, we do ask for implicit trust from families in the first instance, whereby staff and families are the adults best equipped to support young people through challenge.

Thanks again for the ongoing connection of families with our college and its staff; may this continue as we strive to support our young people.

National Reconciliation Week

As we embrace National Reconciliation Week (NRW) this year, our school community comes together to reflect, learn, and actively engage in fostering understanding, respect, and unity among all Australians. NRW, held annually from May 27th to June 3rd, provides us with a significant opportunity to acknowledge the histories, cultures, and contributions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and to work towards a reconciled Australia.

We are very excited about launching our own Acknowledgement of Country video at our NRW Assembly on Tuesday morning which we will also share with the broader community.

We recognise that reconciliation extends beyond the school gates. As members of the broader community, we have a collective responsibility to advocate for justice, equity, and reconciliation. We encourage our students, families, and staff to actively support NRW initiatives, and amplify Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices.

As we commemorate NRW, let us reflect on the importance of reconciliation in building a fairer, more inclusive society. Let us commit to walking together with courage, empathy, and humility, as we strive towards a future where all Australians can live harmoniously, grounded in mutual respect and understanding.

Supporting our Children

I would like to share with you the following story:

A young boy came across a butterfly cocoon and brought it into his house. He watched, over the course of hours, as the butterfly struggled to break free from its confinement. It managed to create a small hole in the cocoon, but its body was too large to emerge. It tired and became still.

Wanting to help the butterfly, the boy snipped a slit in the cocoon with a pair of scissors. But the butterfly was small, weak, and its wings crumpled. The boy expected the insect to take flight, but instead it could only drag its undeveloped body along the ground. It was incapable of flying.

The boy, in his eagerness to help the butterfly, stunted its development. What he did not know was that the butterfly needed to go

through the process of struggling against the cocoon to gain strength and fill its wings with blood. It was the struggle that made it stronger.

You may have heard a variation of this story before. It's a reminder of the fact that while it's hard to watch those who we are close to struggle, often the best help we can provide is to do nothing. By intervening, and shouldering the burden ourselves, we rob those we care about of the opportunity to grow and get stronger.

As a parent, as a friend, or as a spouse, the instinct to help is hard to resist. We see our kids struggling at school, interacting with other children, or falling behind on the playing field, and we want to step in and save them from hardship. We want to offload their pain onto ourselves.

By doing so, however, we're eliminating the circumstances that the people we love need for their own personal development. It's instinctive, and understandable, to want to help. But often the best course of action is to wait and, like the butterfly, let the process unfold on its own terms and timeline.

As Author Robert Tew once wrote, "The struggle you're in today is developing the strength you need for tomorrow. Don't give up."

Sometimes the best gift we can give is to stand on the sideline, shouting encouragement, but allowing the process of growth to run its course.

Parent-Teacher Interviews

Last week saw the college's first round of Parent-Teacher interviews for 2024, providing an opportunity for secondary parents to meet with teaching staff to discuss students' academic progress. In total, there were over 850 interviews conducted across Years 7 to 12 highlighting the shared commitment to the 3-way partnership between students, parents, and families to foster academic success. Should any parents have missed the opportunity to meet face-to-face with a particular teacher, you are encouraged to make contact via phone or SEQTA. Similarly, parents are encouraged to proactively contact teachers throughout the year to discuss any matters or concerns relating to their son or daughter's academic progress.

Year 7 Camp

Throughout week two our Year 7 students attended camp at Wallaroo hosted by Beyond Limits. This camp provided an opportunity for Year 7's to form new friendships and engage in a range of challenge-based activities including Survival Skills, Brain Twisters, Water Obstacles and Beach Games. Overall, this was a fantastic experience for the students, making lifelong memories as part of their St Paul's College journey while also providing an opportunity to develop leadership skills and demonstrate teamwork. In week three a select group of students across Years 9 and 10 attended an overnight camp facilitated by AFL Max and White Ribbon Australia. They carefully selected symbols that resonated with their personal experiences and the spirit of the College, incorporating these elements into their designs.

The resulting artwork tells the story:

"Our community sits under the stars that shine over Kaurna land. As a tight-knit community, we bond together at the meeting place. Each of us is unique, bringing our own shining light, having come a long way to be here. The river represents Dry Creek, with each student represented by their own unique symbol, showcasing their belonging and connection to the St Paul's community."

Year 9 Leadership





Australian Early Development Census

Building a national picture of child health

From May 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

The AEDC is a teacher-completed census (similar to a questionnaire) which provides a comprehensive picture of how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school

The AEDC is an Australian Government Initiative and is completed nationally every three years.

Children don't miss any class time while the AEDC is completed, and parents/carers don't need to supply schools with any new information

The data collected through the AEDC is used by schools, communities and governments to better understand children and families' needs, and identify the services, resources and support they need.

AEDC data is reported at a school, community, state/territory and national level. AEDC results for individual children are not reported and the AEDC is not used as an individual diagnostic tool.

Some teachers have found that completing the AEDC made them more aware of the needs of individual children and their class, and that the data was useful for planning for transitions to Year 1 and developing programs.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary; however, the AEDC relies on all schools with children in their first year of full-time school participating in the collection.

Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census.
