
World Autism Understanding Day 2025

Term 1 Reporting

As we continue to Strive for Excellence, the upcoming school holidays provide an opportunity for all students to reflect on their efforts so far this year. As well as celebrating success and achievement, identifying areas for improvement is also a critical aspect of ongoing personal growth. The Term 1 interim report provides a snapshot of student progress thus far and students are encouraged to lead the conversation with their families regarding their academic progress, putting necessary steps in place to achieve their personal best in

preparation for Term 2.

Term 1 reports will be released via SEQTA at 4pm on the final day of term (Friday, 11 April), and subject-specific parent/teacher conversations will be held in Term 2 (Week 3).

Terms 2 and 3 - Winter Uniform

With Term 2 fast approaching, a reminder of formal winter uniform expectations for students, which includes:

- St Paul's College blazer (compulsory) and required to be worn to and from school, whenever full winter uniform is required.
- Choice of St Paul's College blue-striped long-sleeved shirt (shirt must be tucked-in), for Year 7 to Year 11 students.
- Choice of St Paul's College white long-sleeved Year 12 shirt (shirt must be tucked-in), for Year 12 students only.
- St Paul's College charcoal school pants.
- St Paul's College winter skirt, no shorter than knee length.
- St Paul's College black knitted jumper. (With yellow stripe on neckline)
- St Paul's College tie (Year 7 to Year 11).
- St Paul's College Year 12 tie (Year 12 students only).
- Grey St Paul's College crew socks, with yellow band, or black tights (under skirt).

If there are reasonable circumstances for which your child is unable to wear the full and correct uniform, the College requests that families communicate this with Home Group Teachers via SEQTA direct message, written note, or verbal communication.

From composing digital beats to analysing iconic songs, students are exploring music in innovative ways while refining their technical and creative skills.



Year 7 Music Students Create 'Digital-Beat' Masterpieces

This term, our Year 7 music students have been exploring beat, rhythm and composition through an exciting body percussion and digital music project. Using Incredibox, they crafted unique backing tracks and combined them with expressive body percussion performances. Throughout the process, students developed rhythmic coordination, experimented with musical layers, and refined their timing and

creativity. They also reflected on their work, analysing how beat, rhythm, texture, and structure shaped their final pieces. This hands-on project has been a fantastic way for students to engage with music in an innovative way as well as the opportunity to demonstrate their creativity and performance skills.




Project Compassion Water Walk

Secondary Car Park Safety



Student Drop off and Pick Up Areas

Our College staff car park continues to be a matter requiring improvement to address access for cars at the two key times of each day (morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up). We have had many examples of cars being blocked in due to double parking. Please note that the staff carpark is not the preferred location for students drop off and pickup.

Please refer to the map pictured for locations of drop-off and pick-up zones around the College (highlighted in yellow).

The following are the expectations of families during the busiest morning and afternoon (drop-off and pick-up) periods:

- Use drop-off and pick-up zones or surrounding streets to avoid the carpark
- It is preferable for secondary students to enter via the main double gates on Blacks Rd
- If using the carpark, pull into an empty space or continue driving through. Do not double park behind a parked vehicle
- If no spaces are available, please loop around
- Giveaway to cars exiting a carpark (allow room for that car to reverse)

Our combined understanding and patience will assist in facilitating pick up and drop off for all families.

Premiers Reading Challenge



Are you interested in completing your Premiers Reading Challenge in 2025?

Are you in Year 7 to 12?

How to complete the Challenge?

To complete the Premier's Reading Challenge students, need to read 12 books by the end of Book Week (end of August)

- 1. Students will need a Student Reading Record. This is available from the Resource Centre (if you have not come into the resource centre with your class to do the PRC)
- 2. Read 12 books. Eligible books include e-books, audio books, class/shared reading. * Year 7 to Year 9: Students must read 4 books from the Premier's Reading Challenge booklist and 8 personal choice books.* Year 10 to Year 12: Students must read 12 personal choice books.
- 3. Student PRC records can be kept in the resource centre while completing the challenge (so you don't lose it)
- 4. Complete the Student Reading Record with the title and author for each book. A parent, caregiver, teacher or librarian must sign off on each book to verify it has been read. (Don't wait until you have read all 12- sign off as you read them)
- 5. Completed Student Reading Record are lodged with the library by the end of August.
- 6. Receive an award in late November.
