
Reconciliation Week at St Paul's: Now More Than Ever

Last week, the St Paul's College community came together to recognise National Reconciliation Week with a special assembly. We began with a Smoking Ceremony and Welcome to Country led by Steven Warrior. We were also lucky to have Craig Atkins join our musicians on the didgeridoo.

The theme for this year, "Now More Than Ever: Bridging Now to Next," reminds us that reconciliation is an ongoing journey — one that we walk together, in partnership with First Nations people. At St Paul's, we're committed to listening, learning, and taking real steps forward by supporting and celebrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices and culture.

Throughout the week, students took part in weaving workshops run by Naomi from Deadly Mentorz. These sessions gave students the chance to learn about the cultural importance of weaving — a way for First Nations people to share knowledge, connect with Country, and slow down with purpose. Everyone created their own colourful woven bracelets, making it a hands-on and meaningful experience.

Our co-curricular teams also proudly wore our Indigenous guernseys. Designed by our First Nations student group, the guernseys feature artistic symbols that represent their personal journeys and the spirit of St Paul's — a powerful celebration of culture, connection, and belonging.



Year 11 Retreat

Our Year 11 students recently attended a three-day retreat at Adare House in Victor Harbor. This special experience gave students the chance to step back from their busy routines and focus on growing in their faith, relationships, and spirituality.

Year 10 Art - Artist in Residence Project

Our Year 10 Visual Art students have been busy working with Balinese artist Wayan Dudug in their sculpture unit this term. Using stone and traditional Balinese tools, students are learning new carving techniques and creating beautiful artworks inspired by natural forms.

Wayan has been sharing his skills and stories with the class, helping students to understand more about Balinese culture and the beauty of God's creation.

The students are working on two main projects, wall plaques and totems, which will be displayed around the College later this term. We are excited to see how these pieces turn out and can't wait to share them with our school community.



Year 7 and Year 12 Geography Excursions

Over the past week, Year 7 and Year 12 students in Geography visited different locations for their current topics. In Year 7, students walked to Dry Creek to study not only the natural aspects of the water source, but also the impacts of infrastructure and management in the area. Using the data collected on their excursion, they will be challenged to create their first fieldwork report for the subject.

Meanwhile, the Stage 2 Geography class attended an excursion to the Adelaide CBD with the aim to collect data and conduct some research. Through an Amazing Race-style game seeking international brands and identifying global supply chains in Rundle Mall, to investigating different cultures and imports on Gouger Street, the day offered a range of activities to finalise their topic of "Globalisation".
