Dear Friends and Families of St Paul's,

Our Year 12s are currently undertaking their end of year SACE exams or finalising their last major externally assessed assignments. We take immense pride in our Year 12 students, their dedication and hard work not only reflects their preparation, but also the strong foundation they have built over their years at St Paul's College. We are confident that their results will showcase their efforts and the high standard of education they have received.

While this is in many ways the culmination of thirteen years of education, it is in no way the be all and end all of education. Personally, it is my belief that far too much pressure is placed on students to attain an exceptionally high ATAR. While some students certainly wish to gain direct entry into the University course of their choice (or their number one preference as it is called), it should never be considered a failure if not attained now.

In today's educational world and society in general there are multiple pathways into whatever career a young person may dream of undertaking. To finish secondary schooling with a solid values base and strong set of beliefs is far more important. Psychologists and other experts suggest that today's students will have multiple different careers during their lifetime. If this is true, why does society, families and individuals put themselves under so much pressure? Surely every student and every individual working hard to become the best they can be is enough.

EREA Touchstones

Everyone in our community would have heard, read or seen information regarding the four Edmund Rice Education Australia Touchstones. These are Gospel Spirituality, Inclusive Community, Justice and Solidarity and Liberating Education.

Liberation means to be set free. We could suggest that a Liberating Education is one that allows every person the "freedom" to become whatever it is they wish to become. EREA's definition of a Liberating Education, however, is somewhat different.

As a Catholic College in the Edmund Rice Tradition, we believe that: "We open hearts and minds, through quality teaching and learning experiences, so that through critical reflection and engagement each person is hope-filled and free to build a better world for all."

That definition does not speak of ATAR's or SACE completion but rather our school's hope that we, in partnership with families, produce graduates who have strong enough values to know that life is not all about them as an individual, but rather each one of us has an obligation to contribute to making the world a better place. I am sure you would all agree our world needs young people like this.

I believe this is what St Paul's is excellent at embedding in all we do. Our pastoral care and wellbeing initiatives must encourage all students to become the absolute best version of themselves. The academics obviously support this but do not define who we are. Sometimes this is a hard pitch to convince young girls and boys or parents of this, but it is what we believe.

EREA will soon be finalising and distributing the latest iteration of our Charter. The content and emphases may be altered a little but the essence of what it means to us as a community will not alter. We are a community built around mutual respect and unconditional love for each other. This respect is the basis of our Common Ground document and binds us all to the Touchstones and the College values of Faith, Relationships, Excellence, and Diversity.

As the year draws very quickly to a close and we welcome many new families and students, we also say farewell and thank you to the families who are leaving us for the last time. We hope that the students and families will remain connected to our community and hold fond memories of their time at the College. We hope that they all take with them Certa Bonum Certamen or "Fight the Good Fight" of faith which will help us all make a positive contribution to the world around us.

Year 11 students will conclude formal lessons on Thursday 21 November, while Year 10 students will conclude their final lessons on the following week (Friday 29 November). Year 7 to 9 students' final day is Friday 6 December.

Student Summit on creating safety for all in SA

A delegation of seven St Paul's College students from Year 8 to Year 11 were invited to attend a consultation forum by the National Royal Commission into Violence, Family Violence and Sexual Violence regarding improving safety in the community. This gathering captured opinions and information from 100 secondary students across the state and their feedback will be included in a report to the State and Federal governments in the middle of 2025. Commissioner for the Royal Commission Natasha Stott Despoja and Commissioner for Children and Young People Helen Connelly accepted opinions around 7 key areas related to students, schools, community and safety. These broadly ranged from social media, public transport, safety in school, regional services and physical and sexual violence. Representation from 13 schools across the state, three of which were Catholic Schools, highlighted the issues relating to young people who offered a range of possible solutions for consideration.

St Paul's College students distinguished themselves during the group sessions as articulate and committed young people and the convenor commented on the maturity of their comments and suggestions. Our school worked directly and collaboratively with students from Cardijn College and Blackfriars Priory School during large group sessions, while listening to contributions from schools such as Kildare College, Adelaide High School, Playford International School, Tatachilla Lutheran School, Victor Harbor High School and Kapunda High School among others.

Our inclusion reflects our commitment to take action against violence in our community and reinforces our association with the White Ribbon Association.

PE Updates

Year 8 Boxing Fitness

During Weeks 1 to 4 of Term 4 our Year 8 student took part in a boxing fitness unit in PE. Guided by Pete Pitrakkos from The Train Station Fitness Studio and our PE teachers, students learned various boxing skills while focusing on fitness and discipline. The sessions were designed to build both physical strength and mental resilience, as students practiced basic techniques like jabs, hooks, and footwork. Pete and the PE teachers created a supportive environment that allowed students to push their boundaries, encouraging all students to be active and involved in lessons.

Beyond just technique, the unit emphasised the importance of respect, self-discipline, and focus. Students not only improved their boxing skills but also gained confidence and team spirit through paired activities and drills. The experience received positive feedback, with many students saying they enjoyed the challenge and appreciated the variety boxing brought to their usual PE routine. The skills learned will no doubt contribute to students' overall fitness and well-being.

Year 7 Dance

During Weeks 8 to 10 of Term 3 Year 7 students had the opportunity to participate in a dance unit led by ESO Miss Morant. With a strong background in dance and currently studying teaching, Miss Morant brought energy, expertise, and creativity to each class. Her sessions focused on teaching basic dance routines, rhythm, and coordination, making dance accessible and enjoyable for students of all skill levels.

Throughout the unit, students explored a variety of dances, allowing them to experience different forms of movement and expression. Miss Morant encouraged students to work together, fostering teamwork and confidence. Each lesson included warm-up dances, practice of new moves, and then linking these together as a dance routine. The classes were structured to be both educational and fun, helping students improve their coordination, rhythm, and overall fitness.

The dance unit received overwhelmingly positive feedback, with students embracing the chance to be active in a new way and to express

themselves creatively. Many students shared that they felt more confident by the end of the unit, gaining valuable skills in performance and movement. This dance experience offered Year 7 students a refreshing addition to their HPE curriculum, and they thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity.

Year 10 Outdoor Ed Bushwalking Experience

In Week 2 of Term 4 the Year 10 Outdoor Education students embarked on a three-day bushwalking experience in Deep Creek Conservation Park as part of their Outdoor Education program. Led by Mrs Stace, Miss Marcuccio, and Mr Dorsey, students hiked carrying their own packs, setting up camp each night, and embracing the challenge of outdoor living. Divided into three groups, each tackled varying distances across different terrains, facing hot weather, steep inclines, and rugged paths testing their endurance.

Students navigated cliff-top trails with amazing ocean views, passed through secluded coves, and scrambled over rocky beaches. Along the way, they encountered native wildlife, including kangaroos, butterflies, and many bird species.

Beyond the physical challenges, the bushwalk focused on developing valuable life skills and teamwork. Carrying packs with all their food, water, and gear required planning and resilience.

Each evening, the group set up camp, cooked meals, played games around the campfire and discussed the day's highlights. The food varied from inventive trail snacks to some rather unusual combinations that kept spirits high and conversations lively. These "interesting" culinary choices made the return trip lunch stop at a bakery especially appreciated. After days of hiking meals, the fresh pastries and doughnuts were a perfect end to the week.
