From the Secondary Years

Pastoral Care Program

In an exciting and innovative development within the college pastoral care program, staff will be utilizing 'Wellio' to support the delivery of pastoral care lessons for the remainder of this year and the near future.

Wellio is a digital platform for staff and students, with a content library full of age-specific topics relating to wellbeing that will allow students to engage in Pastoral Care lessons through interactive activities, videos, live quizzes, and reflection questions. Wellio also empowers teachers with the ability to track student progress, while Leaders of House will work with students to best determine relevant topics for students throughout each year. The Wellbeing Council will work with Home Group Teachers to review the program throughout the second semester, for refinement and continual improvement in 2025 and beyond.

Parent Communication Processes

A reminder to parents regarding the following communication processes:

Student absences

Parents are to notify the college of any student absences from school via the school absentee line on 8334 8334, SMS 0409 143 820, or email absentees@stpauls.sa.edu.au by 9:00 am.

We ask that parents avoid sending a SEQTA message or email directly to Home Group Teachers, as it is our reception staff who need this information to accurately mark student absences. Should reception staff not receive this information directly, an SMS will be sent to

parents to verify student absences, as per college procedure.

Parent/Student Contact During School Hours

Any parent/student contact during school hours must occur via Student Services and not via parent/student mobile phones.

This is imperative as it:

- Safeguards the College's duty of care.
- Supports compliance with the Student Mobile Device Policy, with reference to the following points of the policy:
- Mobile devices should not be visible in class, nor should they be a distraction.
- Students are asked and encouraged to lock their mobile device in their assigned locker, to minimise the risk of distraction.
- Students may need to make calls regarding employment, sporting commitments or after school travel arrangements. These calls should be made during recess and lunchtime via the front office (Student Reception), and not on mobile devices and not during lesson time.

In the case of emergency, early dismissal, or passing on messages to students, parents are to contact student reception.

Administration staff will then notify relevant staff to ensure the message is passed on to students or arrange for the student to be sent to the front office for collection. We thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

Student safety at St Paul's College is our highest priority and the safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before school: Primary Years grounds are supervised from 8.20 am.

After school: Primary Years grounds are supervised until 3.30 pm.

Outside these times, Primary Years students on college grounds will not be supervised (unless they are attending OSHC or a supervised co-curricular activity). Parents/carers are requested to ensure

that students do not attend school outside of these supervised times. Families are encouraged to contact Extend Out of School Hours Care for more information about the before and after school care facilities available to our college community.

Regarding concerns around children's behaviour, I ask that you contact your child's teacher as the first port of call if you have any questions about your child that need addressing. Your child's teacher has all the relevant information to quickly resolve a situation or provide the correct information.

Reading

Our commitment to using evidence-based research in the teaching of Reading was highlighted in the Week 2 Newsletter. At St Paul's our vision is to ensure that all students in our community are confident, capable, fluent, and reflective readers. Students in the primary school are involved in a high-quality Literacy program that focuses on the five components of reading: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, comprehension vocabulary, and oral language. But what does all this mean? Over the next few issues, each area will be defined and accompanied by some suggested activities you can do at home.

Phonemic Awareness is the ability to identify and manipulate the individual speech sounds in words called phonemes (Australian Research Organisation). For example, the word cat has three phonemes you can hear, k/a/t. The word shop has four letters but has three phonemes you can hear, sh/o/p.

The English language has 44 different speech sounds:

- 19 consonants: b, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, r, s, t, v, w, y, z
- 7 digraphs: th, sh, ch, wh, ng, ck, ph
- 5 'r-controlled' sounds: ar, er, ir, or, ur
- 5 long vowels: a, e, i, o, u
- 5 short vowels: a, e, i, o, u

More information about phonemes can be found here.

Activity ideas:

- Play rhyming games with your child
- · Ask them what sounds they can hear at the beginning, middle and end of a word
- Change one sound in a word and pass it to the next person; for example cot, cat, cap, map, man
- Sort pictures or objects into groups that start with the same initial sound






Year 8 Art - Lino Printing



Australian Early Development Census

Building a national picture of child health

From May 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

The AEDC is a teacher-completed census (similar to a questionnaire) which provides a comprehensive picture of how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school

The AEDC is an Australian Government Initiative and is completed nationally every three years.

Children don't miss any class time while the AEDC is completed, and parents/carers don't need to supply schools with any new information

The data collected through the AEDC is used by schools, communities and governments to better understand children and families' needs, and identify the services, resources and support they need.

AEDC data is reported at a school, community, state/territory and national level. AEDC results for individual children are not reported and the AEDC is not used as an individual diagnostic tool.

Some teachers have found that completing the AEDC made them more aware of the needs of individual children and their class, and that the data was useful for planning for transitions to Year 1 and developing programs.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary; however, the AEDC relies on all schools with children in their first year of full-time school participating in the collection.

Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census.

Participants can seize the opportunity to develop leadership, communication and problem-solving skills, practice new behaviours, forge life-long friendships and challenge their personal belief systems and values.


